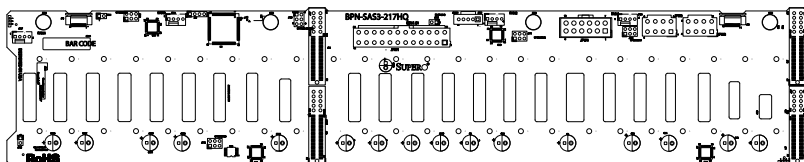

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Returning Merchandise for Service

A receipt or copy of your invoice marked with the date of purchase is required before any warranty service will be rendered. You can obtain service by calling your vendor for a Returned Merchandise Authorization (RMA) number. When returning to the manufacturer, the RMA number should be prominently displayed on the outside of the shipping carton, and mailed prepaid or hand-carried. Make sure that there is enough packaging material surrounding the backplane so that it does not become damaged during shipping.

This warranty only covers normal consumer use and does not cover damages incurred in shipping or from failure due to the alteration, misuse, abuse or improper maintenance of products.

During the warranty period, contact your distributor first for any product problems.

Chapter 1

BPN-SAS3-217HQ Safety Guidelines

To avoid personal injury and property damage, carefully follow all the safety steps listed below when accessing your system or handling the components.

1-1 ESD Safety Guidelines

Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) can damage electronic components. To prevent damage to your system, it is important to handle it very carefully. The following measures are generally sufficient to protect your equipment from ESD.

- Use a grounded wrist strap designed to prevent static discharge.
- Touch a grounded metal object before removing a component from the antistatic bag.
- Handle the backplane by its edges only; do not touch its components, peripheral chips, memory modules or gold contacts.
- When handling chips or modules, avoid touching their pins.
- Put the backplane and peripherals back into their antistatic bags when not in use.

1-2 General Safety Guidelines

- Always disconnect power cables before installing or removing any components from the computer, including the BPN-SAS3-217HQ backplane.
- Disconnect the power cable before installing or removing any cables from the BPN-SAS3-217HQ backplane.
- Make sure that the BPN-SAS3-217HQ backplane is securely and properly installed on the motherboard to prevent damage to the system due to power shortage.

2-1 Front Connectors

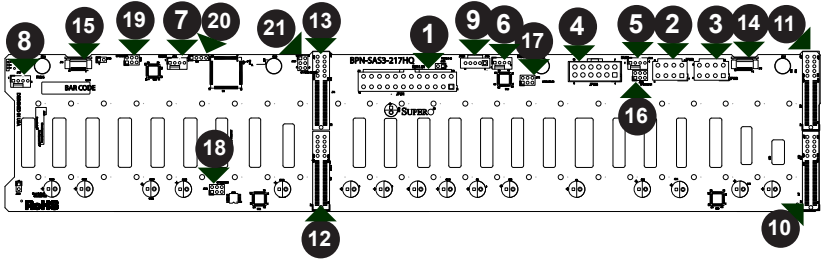


Figure 2-1. Front Connectors

1-4. Power Supply Connectors

These connectors, designated JPW1, JPW2, JPW3, and JPW4 supply power to the four motherboard nodes in the chassis.

5-8. Chassis Fan Connectors

These connectors, designated JP54, JP55, JP56 and JP57 supply power to the chassis. cooling fans.

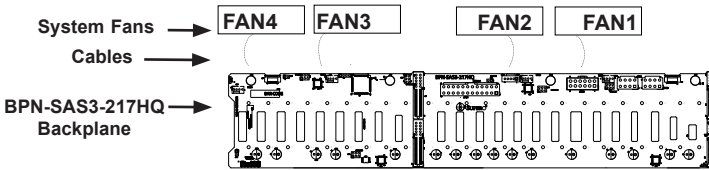


Figure 2-2. Default Configuration - Fans Connected Directly to the Backplane

9. Power Supply SM Bus Connector

The 5-pin connector, designated JPI2C1, connects the power supply SMBus to the MCU.

10-13. Motherboard to Backplane Connectors

These connectors, designated JF1, JF2, JF3 and JF4 connect the motherboards to the backplane on the chassis. JF1 connects to motherboard A. JF2 connects to motherboard B. JF3 connects to motherboard C and JF4 connects to motherboard D. See the table on the previous page to determine the locations of the motherboards within the chassis.

14-15. Backplane to Front Panel Headers

These connectors are designated JF5 and JF6. They connect the backplane to the front LED panels on the chassis. JF5 connects to the LED display panel for motherboards A and B. JF6 connects to the LED display panel for motherboards C and D.

16-19. Upgrade Connectors #1 - #4

These connectors are designated JP70, JP71, JP72 and JP73. They are for the manufacturer's diagnostic use only.

20. Debug MCU

J25 is a port to debug the MCU firmware.

21. Upgrade MCU

JP69 is a port to upgrade the MCU firmware.

2-2 Front Jumpers and Pin Definitions

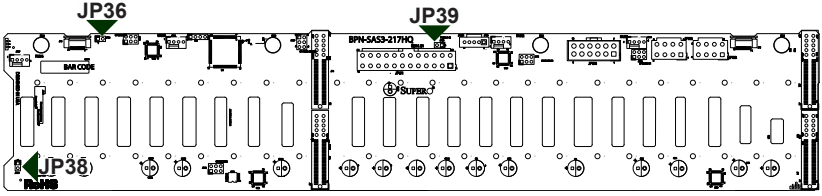
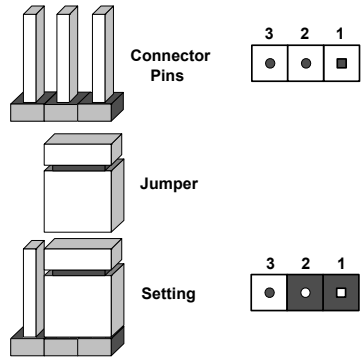


Figure 2-3. Front Jumpers

Explanation of Jumpers

To modify the operation of the backplane, jumpers can be used to choose between optional settings. Jumpers create shorts between two pins to change the function of the connector. Pin 1 is identified with a square solder pad on the printed circuit board. **Note:** On two pin jumpers, "Closed" means the jumper is on and "Open" means the jumper is off the pins.

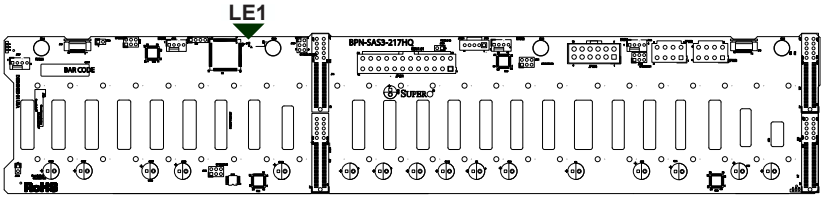


Figure 2-4. Front LED

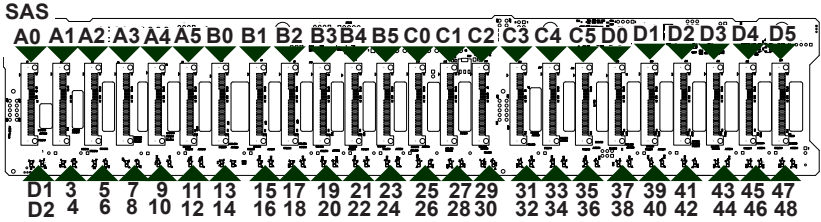


Figure 2-5. Rear Connectors and LEDs

2-5 SAS Ports

The BPN-SAS3-217HQ backplane is designed with four separate nodes, which support from one to four motherboards independently of each other. The SAS ports are used to connect the SAS drive cables. The 24 ports are designated A0, A1, A2, A3, A4, A5, B0, B1, B2, B3, B4, B5, C0, C1, C2, C3, C4, C5, D0, D1, D2, D3, D4, and D5. Each port is also compatible with SATA drives. Use the table below to determine the SAS port to motherboard configuration that is appropriate for your system.

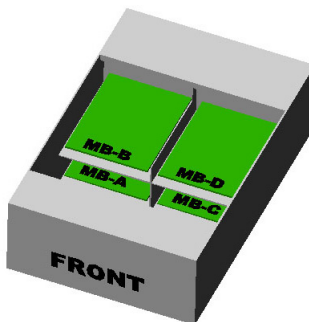


Figure 2-6. Motherboard Locations In the Chassis

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
